

Guidance Counselor Basics

- Freshman Year
 - 9th grade
 - Approximate ages 14-15
- Your Goal
 - Think about college
 - Learn about high school
 - Work at their level in every subject





Guidance Counselor Basics

- Sophomore Year
 - 10th grade
 - Approximate ages 15-16
- Your Goal
 - Begin to prepare for college
 - Include foreign language
 - Take the PSAT for fun





Changing Role of Parents

- Four Seasons of Homeschooling
 - Caretaker
 - Teacher
 - Mentor
 - Friend
- During these years, transition from Teacher to Mentor





Understand Local Homeschool Law

- Know your local laws
- Learn to homeschool high school
- Look ahead to college







Cover the Core


- English: one credit each year
 - Reading, writing at their level
- Math: one credit yearly
 - Work at their math level
- Social Studies
 - American and World History
 - Economics and Government
- Science: start with biology with lab





Beyond the Basics

- Foreign language
 - 2-4 years of 1 language
- Physical Education
 - 2 credit may be required
 - Physically active: count credits
- Fine Art: music, art, theater, dance
 - 1 credit or more






High School Electives

Provide enough electives to total 22-24 or more credits.

Sources of electives:

- 1. Required by state law
- 2. Required by parents
- 3. Earned by delight directed learning







Record Keeping

- Perfect record keeping isn't perfectly tidy
- Keep records in a way that fits you
- Planners and organizers aren't necessary
- Keeping records is necessary





Homeschool Transcript

Official homeschool transcript

- One page abbreviated overview
- Class title, credit value, and grade
- Abbreviated activity list
- 9th grade for summer camps
- 10th grade for car insurance






Course Descriptions

Ingredients of a course description

- 1. Paragraph of what you did
- 2. List of what you used
- 3. Explanation of how you graded
- No more than 1 page per class





Comprehensive Records

- Update each spring
 - You'll know what you have done
 - Don't record what was not done
- Reading List
- Activity List
- Supplemental information







- Annual standardized test
 - Experience and practice
 - Iowa Basic, ITBS, CAT, PSAT-9
- Helps estimate transcript grades
- Experience filling in bubbles
- Practice with timed tests
- Testing around strangers





- PSAT for Fun in 10th grade
- Test in October
- Reading, writing, math
- PSAT is the "starting point" for test preparation and study





- 1. Choose the right test for your child
- SAT
- ACT
- CLT





- 2. Avoid Test Anxiety
- Avoid over-testing
- Avoid early test prep
- Use grade level tests for comparison in 9th grade





- 3. Focus on literacy in 9th grade
- Reading
- Writing
- Basic math skills
- Penmanship
- Vocabulary
- Study skills





- 4. Incorporate test prep into classes
- Begin test prep in 10th grade
- Reading, writing, math
- Replace English workbooks
- Moderate amount of time each day






- 5. Use homeschool skills to motivate
- Sweet treats
- Seek accommodation
- Use a timer
- Read real books





- 6. Invest in test prep for college
- Test scores are closely tied to admission and scholarships
- Schedule test preparation
- Use real sample tests
- 2-4 times each week







Have Reasonable Expectations

- Maturation occurs over 4 years
 - Gradual increase in abilities, organizational skills, responsibility, self-motivation, self-direction
- Balance sleep needs and exhaustion
- Teach for mastery, not perfection
- Natural consequences if appropriate





Maturation and Motivation

- 1. Do be sure to keep reasonable hours
- 2. Do plan appropriate curriculum
- 3. Do plan for increased sleep needs
- 4. Do be sure to mix active and seated work
- 5. Do be sure of reasonable expectations
- 6. Do be sure it's challenging not boring
- 7. Do be sure it would be doable for you
- 8. Do be sure you don't expect perfection
- 9. Do be flexible, homeschooling is not a race
- 10. Do be sure you have a back up plan





Set Technology Boundaries

New world of parenting problems

- Balance online education with non-digital coursework
- Balance free time spent online
- Consider social media safety






Set Technology Boundaries

Suggested boundaries

- One hour on games
- Set a time for playing online
- No technology or cell phone in the bedroom, bathroom, or mealtimes
- Parents possess all passwords





Important Technology Discussions

- Internet addiction
- Personal safety
- Future consequences
 - Everything online is public
 - Everything online is forever
 - Consequences of posting or sharing inappropriately





Stay Strong Sophomore Year

- Be sure to start foreign language
- Take the PSAT for fun in 10th grade
- Decide between SAT or ACT
- Start studying for SAT or ACT
- Consider Subject Tests
 - SAT Subject Test
 - AP Class or AP Exam
 - CLEP Exam








Understand Financing

- Set money aside
- Learn about college savings
 - Consult an accountant or banker
 - Read Dave Ramsey
 - Investigate 529 Plans
- Student can earn and save money
- Teach a strong work ethic





Earn Scholarships

- Choose colleges to apply
 - Reach
 - Fit
 - Safety
- Apply to 4-8 colleges
- Public and private schools

REACH SCHOOL

SAT or ACT score average is higher than yours or school is highly selective.

You meet the college requirements.

Your SAT or ACT Score

FIT SCHOOL

SAT or ACT score average is about the same as yours.

You meet the college requirements.

SAFETY SCHOOL

SAT or ACT score average is less than yours.

You exceed the college requirements.

- 5. Genuine activities
- 6. Letters of recommendation
- 7. College visits
- 8. Timely application
- 9. Great application essays

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Activities and Leadership

- Activities build a resume
- Activities improve admission
- Volunteering, leadership, and work
- Technology can be impediment
- Find passion and interests





Investigate Careers

- Read books about careers
- Find assessment tools
- College fairs and discussion
- Employment and self-discovery
- "Field testing" careers
- Entrepreneur experiences
- Find mentors with interests





Extra Credit for Sophomore Year

- Research future dual enrollment
- Attend a college fair
- Visit colleges in the spring







Big Idea for Success #1 Seek Balance

- Put weakest areas first
- Have a morning meeting
 - Morning meeting motivation
 - Daily time of reflection
 - Regular meeting with friends
 - Margin and self-care





Big Idea for Success #2 Remain Calm


- You can't possibly be behind
- Anything can be fixed in Junior year
- Start strong, and do what you can
- Don't double-up trying to catch up
- Choose self-teaching curriculum
- This too shall pass...
- This is a season, not a life sentence





Big Idea for Success #3 Encourage Delight Directed Learning

- Encourage their passion
- What do they do for fun?
- Collect high school credits
- Avoid turning fun into "schoolwork"
- Capture natural high school credits





Big Idea for Success #4 Take Advantage of Breaks

- Relax during break
- Update homeschool records
- Take continuing education classes
- Plan ahead for the coming year
- Collect summer credits
- Add summer activities to activity list





Big Idea for Success #4 Take Advantage of Breaks

- Retain core math skills
- Read books on College Bound List
- Enjoy meaningful activities
- Employment or volunteer service





Big Idea for Success #5 Take Continuing Education Classes

- Take Gold Care Club monthly classes
 - Quick start
 - Beginner
 - Intermediate
 - Advanced
 - Encouragement
- Yearly homeschool conventions
